The agencies on this list will serve two populations of youth:

1. Youth in Care

Youth ages 16 to 21 who are in a county or tribal-approved out-of-home placement, including youth who, at age 16 or older, were adopted or had permanent legal and physical custody transferred to a relative.

This does not include youth whose placement is in any of the following facilities: hospitals, inpatient chemical dependency treatment facilities, facilities that are primarily for delinquent children, any corrections facility or program within a particular correction's facility not meeting requirements for Title IV-E facilities as determined by the commissioner, facilities to which a child is committed under the provision of chapter 253B, forestry camps, or jails.

2. Youth who have Left Care

- a. Youth ages 16 to 21 that experienced a county, tribal social service or corrections- approved placement of 30 days or longer after age 16.
- b. Youth ages 16 to 21 that left care after being adopted at age 16 or older.
- c. Youth age 16 to 21 that left care after having their legal custody transferred to a relative at age 16 or older.

This does not include youth who left care because the county, tribal social service or corrections agency reunited them with their biological family within 30 days.

All youth served will have a written transition plan based on a life skills assessment and will be directly involved in learning and practicing independent living skills.

Youth served, while in care, will leave care with housing, employment, health care coverage, vital documents, a high school diploma or GED, a savings account, a means of transportation, a connection to a caring adult, and if desired, the groundwork laid to attend postsecondary school. Youth served who are out of care will be assisted to accomplish the same goals.
